SOS Fundraising Campaign Kicked Off (Save Our Sloop)

Our campaign for the restoration of the Woody Guthrie's frame kicked off on May 22 with the Save Our Sloop Social and Garden Party at the 1862 Peter C. DuBois House, home of Lynn and David Eberle on May 22nd.

An enthusiastic crowd braved threatening weather to enjoy an impressive selection of food and drink donated by club members. Entertainment was provided by the Howland Wolves. They put on a great show with their mix of rock and jazz. Thank you to Chris Ruhe and the wolves for supporting our cause.

This was the first in a series of special events to raise funds for the restoration work on the Woody Guthrie planned to start in the fall of 2012. Thirty-three years in the water have taken their toll on our wooden boat.

The renovation involves the replacement and repair of elements of her frame, requiring the services of a professional shipwright and specialized materials. The scope and estimates are based on a survey of the boat performed by shipwright James Kricker of Rondout Woodworking. The most-efficient, lowest-cost, method of accomplishing this renovation is to transport the boat to a shipwright's facility and to have all the work done at one time. With transportation, barging, and restoration we estimate the total cost of the project to be \$150,000-\$200,000.

There will be more events coming up throughout the next two years and more good fundraising ideas are needed. The next event will be a picnic at Aimee and Tom Labarr's on August 6^{th} . Come out and help us save the Woody!

Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, June 3, 2011

Opening. Wearing a Strawberry-red pullover, Club President, **Rosemary Thomas** opened the June meeting and welcomed first-time visitors from Beacon, Nyack, New York City and New Jersey.

Treasurer, Sarah Elisabeth, reported a closing balance of \$34,793.41 (see Treasurer's Report elsewhere in the newsletter). Expenses for Woody maintenance offset a generous \$1,000 grant from the Easter Foundation, harbor, sailing class and membership income. Sloop Woody Guthrie, Gigi Fris, (See the full Woody Report elsewhere in the **Broadside**) After reporting the Woody docked in site of the meeting, Gigi introduced Woody Captain **Tom Baldino** to announce regretfully that the Woody would not be appearing at Cornwall this vear. Too much interior & deck work remains unfinished. and the Sloop is not safe for the public. Meanwhile work continues this week, and the Woody will be ready for the Strawberry Festival (and Tom's 76th birthday!). Tom noted that 17 new sailors had completed the winter sailing classes. Harbor Master Chris Ancliffe announced that he can no longer serve in the role. Rosemary asked for volunteers to replace Chris -- who

has devoted enormous energy to improve the docks and the harbor, create the possibility for open water sailing

classes and to keep fees and service competitive with

neighboring harbors. Woody Fundraising. Tom Baldino announced an opportunity to recycle your old TV, computer & electronic gear. Bring it all to City Hall on July 23rd. You will be charged \$5 per item – probably less than round trip gas to the County dump + much less than their fee! Half the overall income will go to the Sloop Club and half to Clearwater. Zero Waste Starts Here

One of our visions for this year's festival season, and the earth, is to significantly reduce the amount we send into the waste stream. Wouldn't it be amazing if we could get all the way down to zero waste?

At Strawberry Festival we will be inaugurating our glorious new Earthcare Pods: five welcoming, colorful stations, evenly spaced and clearly visible throughout the festival. Each pod will contain one basket for plastic bottles, one basket for glass and metal, one can for compostables (non-meat food, napkins, and our bowls, cups and spoons, which are made from biodegradable cornstarch), one "All Else" can for everything that cannot be recycled or composted, beautiful signs to help people determine what goes where, and two earthcare educators to assist people with this process and provide helpful information to the public.

Vendors have been requested to comply with our zero waste goal by using biodegradable serving goods and packing out all of their own recyclables and all else. We are hoping that everyone will honor our vision.

How can you help?

- ❖ Become a Pod Person. Sign up to help staff and manage the pods – we need lots of volunteers so we can do one to two hour shifts. Bringing your own chair would be a big help (we have a chair shortage at festivals).

These summer ideas are really "Cool"-ing by Ken Miller

The "Dog Days" of summer are now approaching. So the next thing is to find ways to save energy while staying cool.

As the heat rises in your building, allowing it to continue up and out is the goal. Natural roof ventilation through roof vents can be enhanced by the use of solar attic fans (\$300 for the part), or something as simple as a "Roof Turbine". Turbines cost about \$60, (for the part), and work best if there is a 5 MPH breeze. Neither item requires you to use power companies. The goal is always to get yourself off the grid a little at a time.

The same insulating tips that I wrote about in the past, to keep your home warm in the winter can work in the summer. Now the North or any shady side of the house is where you want to let air in. Preferably on ground level or even below (basement). Shaded areas can be as much as 20 degrees lower in the summer.

Perry fielded a wide variety of questions on many different environmental issues highlighting many ways to do things 'smarter'.




