Club President David Eberle welcomed first-time visitors – from Wappinger, Beacon, New Jersey and New York City.

Elections. The slate of officers from the November meeting -- David Eberle and Steve Schwartz, for president; Saul Rosinsky, for vice president; Sarah Elisabeth for treasurer; and James Malchow for secretary - was presented to the membership. A motion to close nominations was passed unanimously. A motion to select David Eberle as president was passed with a show of hands. The Secretary moved to accept the slate as proposed. The motion was seconded and passed with no objection. Congratulations to our new officers! Editor's note: A motion was passed to thank outgoing secretary Vane Lashua for his service to the club. Cajun Dance Save Our Sloop Fundraiser

Over one hundred attendees stepped out to the Hudson Valley's own Krewe de la Rue who were just fantastic. Their energy and enthusiasm was contagious. There were lots of seasoned dancers as well as many newbies who came early for the dance lessons.

Many of folks helped out with food, set-up, clean-up, decorating, and all the little things that made the event a success. We thank you all! A special mention goes to John Allen and his gumbo. What would a Cajun dance be without gumbo?

Congratulations to Nancy Farren who won the dinner for two at the Culinary Institute in Hyde Park. Thank you to Andra for arranging this.

This was another great example of fun through fundraising so keep those ideas coming. We are getting near the half way point to our goal for the Woody restoration but still have a long way to go.



The most important public water supply in Southern Dutchess County comes from wells owned by the Village of Fishkill located near Route 9 in the Town of Fishkill. The wells tap the highly productive Clove Creek aquifer.

A powerful local family, the Montforts, own several parcels of land along Route 9 from near Clove Road in Fishkill to the



Putnam County line. For many years, they have engaged in or proposed activities at these parcels that would/did have a negative environmental impact, possibly damage water quality, or both. Their plans have been routinely approved by the Town of Fishkill only to be turned down or severely modified later by the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC).

Montfort's "Sour Mountain" proposal would have blasted rock from the side of Fishkill Ridge for 150 years: denied by the DEC. It's Southern Dutchess Sand and Gravel Mine (SDS&G) removed soil to within 5 feet of the top of the aquifer by permit, then obtained a new 3-year permit to mine below the waterline. Exposing the aquifer to air would accelerate water quality degradation. Since the mine is located one mile upgradient from the public water supply, the Fishkill Ridge Caretakers (FRC) a citizen group formed at a Beacon Sloop Club meeting, argued for restrictions that were included in the DEC permit: no mining has taken place. The FRC is made up of BSC members and mostly local residents

Montfort's Highland Valley proposal was a 210 unit manufactured home development on the SDS&G mine site. These dwellings have socio-economic value, but not when located 5 feet above an irreplaceable public water supply. The DEC's many environmental questions went unanswered; the application was withdrawn.

Better land use decisions are better arrived at when planners have a complete understanding of the project at hand. To approve one activity without knowing how that activity will be used in a future, unnamed project, is called segmentation. Segmentation has a negative impact on informed planning. Montfort's new twist is to subdivide a 203.87 acre parcel into 2 lots near Clove Road. The smaller17.85 acre portion will be transferred to the Village of Fishkill for a future water facility. The twist: this is not a gift. In return Montfort is now guaranteed to buy 60,500 gallons of treated Village aquifer water per day; it may be used for use at any parcels of land Montfort owns along Route 9. The lesson here is to keep informed and take action on proposals brought up at planning and other board meetings.
